Editorial

Glimpses of a Post-Covid World

As we bring down the curtain on another difficult year and ring in the New Year, two points appear to be clear: the departure phase of the pandemic will be long drawn and challenging; and that COVID-19 will leave behind a significantly altered world. Despite the many dark clouds of uncertainty that still hover; there is cause for optimism at the sunny and clear blue patches appearing on the horizon. Glimpses of a Post-COVID world can be gleaned.

This is a good time to remember that the year 2022 is special; it marks the completion of seventy-five years as an independent country. It is also a good time to reflect on the public policy challenges - in primary healthcare, school education, and livelihoods - that we will encounter in the year ahead and consider how we might use evidence and data to push 'Back to the Future'; to achieve, if not in full, in substantial measure the Pre-COVID momentum in development governance.

The focus should be two-fold: First, bringing back children to schools, and helping them bridge the learning deficits that emerged; restoring essential health care services that have been disrupted, especially ante-natal care and immunisation; and reconstructing the livelihood avenues in both the informal and formal sectors. Second, to refocus on those most in need of help, addressing the deprivations of the disadvantaged and vulnerable populations, to ensure that public policy interventions 'leave no one behind'. This will only work when we yoke the idea of public service delivery and civic participation, together.

For all of us at the Public Affairs Centre (PAC), and its analytics arm, the Centre for Open Data Research (CODR), these imperatives must translate into more rigorous evidence-based analysis, marshalling the transformative power of data analytics to draw insights, and partnering governments to help them make socially accountable interventions. Advancing 'Social Accountability' is important because in a modern democracy, the fundamental political relationship that influences socio-economic development is that between the citizen and the state. The stakeholders in the development process - the government, the market, and civil society - have an important role in this process if we are to progress towards a just and humane society.

Much of our work at the PAC should be aimed at catalysing such development praxis. This then will constitute the 'Sine Qua Non' for all of us at the PAC.

Q: DULT plays a crucial role in urban development, please provide an overview of the work you/your department does.

A: The DULT has been set up by the Government of Karnataka (GoK) in 2007 under the Urban Development Department (UDD) objective to coordinate planning and implementation of urban transport projects and programmes in the State. Karnataka is the only state in India to have an exclusive Directorate for planning Urban Land Transport. Since its inception, the Directorate has implemented many initiatives including service level benchmarking in Bengaluru, developing policies on parking, creating mobility plans for cities in Karnataka and conducting feasibility studies for mass transit systems etc.

The following are the broad level functions of the DULT:

- Conduct periodic assessment of travel demand and determine the level of public transport required in different cities and the type of transport systems required through various studies
- Provide required hand-holding support for conceptualising and implementing mass transit /Public transport/Non-Motorised Transport (NMT) projects
- Assess and recommend new investments required for creation of new infrastructure in transport sector
- Develop integrated policies and guidelines on urban transport issues in urban as well as peri-urban areas
- Carry out in-house studies on emergent issues relating to traffic management
- Conduct capacity building workshops for government officials.

Q: Specific to some cities, DULT has done some remarkable work which has made an impact, for example in Mysuru etc. Could you share some of the key aspects/best practices on the same?

A: The Directorate has spearheaded the implementation of Karnataka's first and only Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) system between the twin cities of Hubballi and Dharwad; the State's and the country's first Public Bicycle Sharing (PBS)



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System in Mysuru; *Cycle Day Initiative* across Bengaluru City as part of its awareness and community outreach initiatives to promote sustainable transportation and introduction of organised public transport in 20+ cities in Karnataka in collaboration with the State Transport operators, It has also supported upgrading of transit infrastructure like depots and terminals across the State by providing funds to the tune of Rs 139 crore as its share for fifty one projects at a total project cost of Rs 311 crore.

Some of the key aspects/best practices related to important projects implemented by DULT are as follows:



Hubballi-Dharwad BRTS project

- **Hubballi-Dharwad BRTS project** was the first project in which substantial investment was made on improving public transport in a two-tier city
- More than 70 acres of land in Hubballi-Dharwad have been successfully acquired through consent awards surmounting the challenges of acquisition of land in a developed and built up area
- Three Bus Only Flyovers, the first of their kind in the country, have been constructed for BRTS.
- ITS has been implemented at the system level for the first time in Karnataka encompassing an automated fare collection system, automated vehicle location system, robust depot management system, control centre for monitoring of BRTS operations, Control centre for monitoring of traffic at junctions etc.



Cycle Day

- Implementing an open street event known popularly as Cycle Day, in association with community partners to promote and popularise cycling in Bengaluru since 2013.
- Engagement with community in a proactive manner has led to the success and popularity of the initiative and has also renewed interest in cycling. DULT has been able to get more than 50 neighbourhoods actively involved in the promotion of cycling in Bengaluru



Church Street first

- For the first time in the State, a busy commercial street was taken up by implementation of a testbed to test and demonstrate electric vehicle and air quality monitoring technologies in collaboration with IISc and Catapult, UK. The Street was also pedestrianised on all weekends from November 2020 to April, 2021
- IISc conducted a concurrent research by collecting and analysing data through qualitative and quantitative methods and brought out a report which has demonstrated the impact of pedestrianisation on improvement of air quality, increasing namma metro usage, and overall impact of Quality of Life parameters.

Best practice: **Collaboration with academia and start-ups.**

Q: What are the challenges that urban department/sector face at a public policy level, as per your understanding?

A: The first and foremost challenge is to bring about necessary awareness and behavioural change and shift of preference to the use of more sustainable modes. Though the National Urban Transport Policy lays emphasis on facilitating mobility of people rather than on mobility of vehicles, the intent of the policy has not been realised to the desired extent due to lack of strong measures towards containing the sale and use of personal vehicles. Also, investments on development of non-motorised transport infrastructure including provision of cycle lanes etc have not been adequate. Often, well-intentioned policies fail due to adequate provision of funds and availability of capacities at institutional and individual level to deliver the expected outcomes. Conflicting priorities of different departments at the National as well as the State level also impact the realisation of policy objectives. Evidence-based decision making or policy formulation is also adversely affected due to lack of robust data.

Q: You wear a dual hat, apart from being the Commissioner at DULT, you are also the Director General at the Administrative Training Institute (ATI), Mysuru. We understand that you are rejuvenating this 62 years old apex institute. What is the thought process that made you take this initiative?

A: The Administrative Training Institute (ATI), Mysuru is a premier training institute in Karnataka. ATI has been providing foundation and refresher training programmes to officials belonging to the Karnataka Administrative Services as well as many other state services. It is the ATI's role and responsibility to equip government officials with the required skills and knowledge to provide efficient, transparent and citizen-friendly administration. Innovation in training methods and approach is the need of the hour rather than continued reliance on so-called time-tested methods. ATI also needs to expand its horizons, and focus on implementation research, data analytics and creation of useful and engaging content. Choosing the right faculty and resource persons and investing on upgrading their skills is also a must for bringing about a quantum jump in the quality of training imparted in the institute.



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Q: What is your experience in working with NGOs like Public Affairs Centre and academic institutions like Indian Institute of Science, how do you envisage that this partnership is useful?

A: *In our experience, fruitful collaboration between Government, academia and industry will go a long way in finding optimal solutions to vexing and complex issues. We need to leverage each other's strength and must work together to accomplish common goals.*

In the process of working with NGOs like Public Affairs Centre and institutions of higher learning and research like Indian Institute of Science (IISc), government organisations like ATI or DULT could imbibe best practices, and also gain an enlightened perspective on their own domain.

Due to COVID 19, almost all countries globally have lost about 52 million people. About 4.5 million people have died in our country.

As a field researcher, as we have seen, COVID 19 has had the largest impact on urban, rural areas. It has affected people of all classes, especially on roadside vendors, workers or employees working in private enterprises and industries, farmers, the people who suffer from more than one disease, and public service sector workers, economic, health and social life.

Malnutrition had a serious effect on the nutritional level of the children availing services at schools and Anganwadi centers. Farmers in rural areas have been economically deprived of transporting vegetables to urban areas / markets due to lack of transport and lockdown. General patients are forced to go to private hospitals without proper treatment due to the lack of medical staff, and the burden of debt is high due to the high cost. Employees of private companies, including healers, work as a vegetable and fruit business, and there are many examples.

Since students, especially primary and secondary school children, have been deprived of education for two consecutive years and are now working with fathers and mothers in urban areas, we can see there is a significant decline in the attendance of children at schools. The abuse of some children by some people, the chances of being transformed into social deadly forces cannot be denied. In addition, the cases reported in the highest numbers of child marriages for minors / girls are alarming.

However, since last August 2021, there has been a concerted effort to return to normalcy with little sigh. But still the Covid-19 mutant viruses continue to raise fears. In our country, given its many problems and variations, the Ministry of Health is conducting the Covid-19 vaccine campaign in collaboration with other departments, making the most commendable and most successful vaccine in our country, a model for the world.

Working as a field researcher, we had to meet very difficult conditions to reach the community and perform project work. Because of the lack of transport, non availability of the lodges and food, and the fear of COVID-19, most of our work was halted. But since August 2021 we have gradually started rebuilding and reaching the targeted community.

As a Field Research Officer, I have noticed both positive and negative aspects of working with communities during and post the COVID-19 pandemic. Few areas of changes that I have witnessed include, increased health concerns among people in the community; young people's interest in agriculture at the community level etc. Learning about the use of the internet at the community level has led to the effective use of technology by them in accessing various online video calling platforms like zoom etc. Communities have also been exposed to the benefits of folk medicines which are made from herbs found in nature.

The lessons learned from COVID -19 while working in the community are as follows.

Unity: This has increased the interdependence of people within communities. People have become interdependent for their day-to-day activities.

Religion: I have witnessed a reduction in religious differences and conflicts.

Nature: Covid-19 has taught people of the community to live in harmony with nature and has promoted cleaner organic farming.

Environment: Due to Covid-19 reductions in vehicular traffic in urban areas and the shutdown of factories, there has been reduced pollution.

Gender Inequality: Gender Inequality, I believe, has reduced to an extent. Covid-19 has increased interdependence in family life and allowed people to understand each other. The inevitability of sharing their feelings and opinions with family members may be helping the household activities of men and women.

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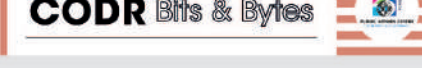
